Veronica Shonkwiler and Jessica Sloan (K/1):

This month in science, the K/1 group has started their physical science unit. They are learning about force and motion, including different kind of simple machines. For social studies we will be discussing history and how things have changed over time. This unit will include learning about how the pilgrims and Native Americans met their basic needs and now their methods were different from ours today.

Chris Kuhns (K-4):

This month, we went on a field to Columbus Zoo! Our kids really loved and fascinated what they had seen at the zoo especially with gorillas! We also focused on this month's theme, Snow White and 7 Dwarves,



based on 7 dwarves' characters and emotions. A week before Thanksgiving, we worked on manners, such as please, I want, and thank you. We continue to be amazed on how our students have flourished with their characteristics from the beginning of school year to current date.

Morgan Sipka, Kaleigh Bowling and Gretchen Douglas (2nd/3rd):

This month, second and third graders read and learned about various countries in Social Studies. We were all very curious especially about what language people speak, what they wear, traditional cultural foods, holidays they celebrate and famous sights to see. Countries we read about included China, Japan, India, Mexico, Brazil, France, Australia, Brazil and Kenya. We can't wait to learn more about various traditions and cultures! In science we have been learning about plants! We can tell you what plants need to survive, what each part of the plant is called, and what it does. We are also learning about different ways seeds move and what seeds look like for different plants.

In Social Studies, fifth graders have been exploring the Oregon Trail and westward movement. All have decided they are fortunate not to have to move across the country in a wagon. In Science, the kiddos have been working hard learning and doing projects. The fourth grade students have been learning about the fossil life. We made dinosaur and shell fossils, which was a lot of fun! The fifth grade students have been learning about different forms of energy. They will continue to learn in depth about light and sound through fun hands-on activities!

Greetings from Middle School Department!! It is cold and snowy here in Columbus! The kids were thrilled to see snow but were not enjoying the cold. Please encourage your student to look at the weather forecast ahead and dress accordingly.

In Science, the 6th grade students are finishing up soil, and then moving on to cells. The seventh grade students are studying the atmosphere. The eighth graders are studying erosion and deposition. In Social Studies, the 6th grade students just started learning about present-day Africa. The seventh grade students are studying the Ancient Africa. The students in the 8th Grade are studying the three branches of government.

In Math, the 6th grade students are finishing up the place value, and how to read and write numbers. The 7th grade students are working on reading, writing and computing decimals. The 8th grade students are working on writing expressions and equations with variables. All the students are working on subtracting with regrouping, multiplying and dividing. They all finished with the addition concept.

In Writing, the 6th graders are studying the prequel to Peter Pan which is under the genre of fantasy. They are reading a story about Peter and the Starcatchers. They are also learning prepositions. The 7th and 8th graders are studying the genre: Mystery. They just learned about what detectives do when they arrive to a scene. Now they are creating a news broadcast about a "fake" crime that occurred in the OSD library. 7th graders are learning prepositions while 8th graders are learning infinitives.

Terry Stewart's class (Colleen, Steven, Nathan) went to the zoo on Nov 5th. We saw elephants, gorillas and snow leopards. The weather was perfect and we had fabulous time! We went with Tamara and Chris' classes.

Last Friday (11/14) during 0 period we had health class and the students learned how to make healthy pancakes using only 3 ingredients: bananas, peanut butter, and eggs. Ask them to make it for you sometime during Thanksgiving break.

Federal Student Aid is responsible for managing the student financial assistance programs authorized under Title IV of the Higher Education Act of 1965. These programs provide grants, loans, and work-study funds to students attending college or career school.

A.C.T Testing!

Attention College Bound Juniors, seniors and 4plus students!

ACT Special Testing will be offered at Ohio School for the Deaf in Feb 2015. Registrations and payment are due to Sheri Uhrin before student's leave for Christmas Break (Dec 19, 2014).

To get signed up:

1. Student should pick up a special testing application from Sheri Uhrin (on the bulletin board outside of my office)
2. Complete Sections A,D, L and N of the applications. WRITE NEATLY.
 - a. ACT Regular = tests in the following subjects
 - English
 - Math
 - Reading
 - Science
 - b. ACT w/Writing = the above tests AND a writing exam
 - Gallaudet/NTID and other 4-year colleges/universities require you to take the writing test at least 1 time.
3. Submit application with payment to Sheri Uhrin.
4. Payment should be a *check/money order* made payable to ACT.
5. Applications are then submitted. Once ACT approves the application, testing will be set up for the student.

Reading Tips and Specials

Linking Literacy and Movement

As educators, we have the daunting task of trying to get students to sit and pay attention. Kids are constantly out of their seats and/or wiggling in their chairs as if they have ants in their pants. After a few years of repeatedly asking my students to "sit down" while they worked, my mentality started to change. Why was I requiring my students to stay in their seats while they worked? If they were able to stand and get the work done, why not allow them to do so. This leads me to the link between literacy and movement. There are some clear cognitive benefits of movement. Young children, especially our students, need to physically experience concepts in order for them to really understand. Even though more is required of teachers and students when it comes to their education, movement can still be incorporated into daily lesson plans. Research shows that movement is a young child's preferred mode of learning and that they learn best by being actively involved. Instead of requiring our students to always sit down and do worksheets, why not get them up and moving while learning at the same time?

For example, when teaching prepositions such as *under* the slide, *through* the tunnel, *over* the chair-why not have students physically doing these things while signing the words. Another example is when teaching adjectives such as walk *slow*, jump *high*, or write *messy*-have the students perform these actions to get them moving and ensure understanding.

Second and third grade students in Ms. Kaleigh Bowling's class have been working with Ms. Bowling, Mrs. Angie Layman (PE teacher), and myself to incorporate movement into their daily literacy skills. Using common core state standards that are required for their grade level, we come up with activities to get the students "up and moving" while learning at the same time. Not only are the students more motivated, but concepts also tend to stick better when learned along with movement. Try to use movement at home to help students practice spelling/sight words or when retelling a story. Not only



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will this help stimulate their brains, but it will make homework time much more exciting for everyone involved! Pictured to the left is third grade student, Xavier Veatch and second grade student, Bo Porter.

Routine annual influenza vaccination is recommended by the Centers for Disease Control (CDC) for all persons aged 6 months and older who do not have contraindications. HS science classes were invited to attend a lecture series at the Ohio State University on Nov. 19, 2014. Students who attended learned about dark matter and dark energy in the universe. Students' minds were inflated like that of matter as a new theory suggests.

Two seniors, Gregory Rinker and Zack Davenport; and two juniors, Jenny Mendis and JohnMichael Taylor were selected to be on the Spartan AB team. They will participate in the competition at the Kentucky School for the Deaf in February.

Physical Science classes are studying matter (PS01- States of Matter and PS02- Periodic Table), biology classes are studying cells (Bio01- Cell Structure and Function and LS02- The Chemistry of Life), and Environmental Science classes are studying the formation of earth and earth's atmosphere (ES 01 and ES02). The PS02, Bio01, and ES02 classes will have a semester exam during the week of January 12th.

Mr. Coy-Gonzalez's English and Language Arts classes are in the beginning stages of research papers. Students are learning about the structure, process, format, and source credibility to support them in this endeavor. Leadership students developed both personal and class mission statements. They are developing the skills of compromise and teamwork. Language Development over Thanksgiving Break!

Time off from school is the perfect time to focus on language and communication at home. Remember to use multiple forms of communication such as ASL, printed English, pictures, and spoken English (if possible) during interactions with your child to help promote language. Here are three fun activities to work on language development with your students during Thanksgiving Break!

Activity #1: Do a Thanksgiving "Taste Test"!

Use two large pieces of paper. On one page, make two columns "I like it!" and "I don't like it". Every time your child tastes a food write/draw the food in one of the columns! On the other paper write down adjectives to describe the food (example: salty, sweet, chewy).

Activity #2: Label Family Members

Your child may be excited to see relatives that you don't often see. Now is a great time to remind your child about who all of those people are. Go through photos and practice labeling people with their names and their role in your family ("Aunt Carole", "Uncle Joe"). Make a family tree to help your child understand how each person is related to them.

Activity #3: Make a Pie!

Cooking activities are great opportunities for language development! Using a mini pie crust and pre-made pie filling you have a quick and easy opportunity to work on following directions and vocabulary development. ■

free and quick, and it gives you access to the largest source of financial aid to pay for college or career school.

In addition, many states and colleges use your FAFSA data to determine your eligibility for state and school aid, and some private financial aid providers may use your FAFSA information to determine whether you qualify for their aid. <https://fafsa.ed.gov/index.htm>

When we get books from regular book stores or donations, we have to create our own record that includes the title, author, publication date, book summary, and other information about the book. We also have to assign the book a bar code, which is what we scan to check out books. Next the book needs a spine label that shows its call number which tells where the book will be shelved. We also check to see if the book has an Accelerated Reader (AR) quiz, and if it does, we write that information inside the front cover and put a pink dot sticker on the book spine. The bar code and spine labels need to be covered with a clear plastic label. The book also needs to be stamped with the school name and address inside the covers. If the book is a paperback, it may need a special plastic covering. If the book is a hardback with a dust jacket, that requires a different kind of plastic cover. Once this is all done, the book is ready for checkout! ■


